
My three sons

Photographer Ralph Barrera has his hands full, and he loves it. On this Father's Day weekend, his family shares some special moments of the past 2 years.


ometimes the path to fatherhood can be a little like a car ad: zero to 60 in no time flat.

But fatherhood had a bittersweet beginning for Ralph, an American-Statesman photographer.

When his first son, Reece, was born the day after Easter 2000, Ralph's natural instinct would have been to share the happy news with his parents. Instead, life's greatest gift — the birth of a child — was tempered by one of life's greatest sorrows — the loss of a parent. Ralph's father had died just one day earlier. And his mother's death a few months before compounded the ache.

Perhaps it is that dichotomous start that gave Ralph the fortitude to survive his next challenge of fatherhood: twins! Born when Reece was not quite 20 months old, Caden and Mason are everything you'd imagine twins to be: engaging,
