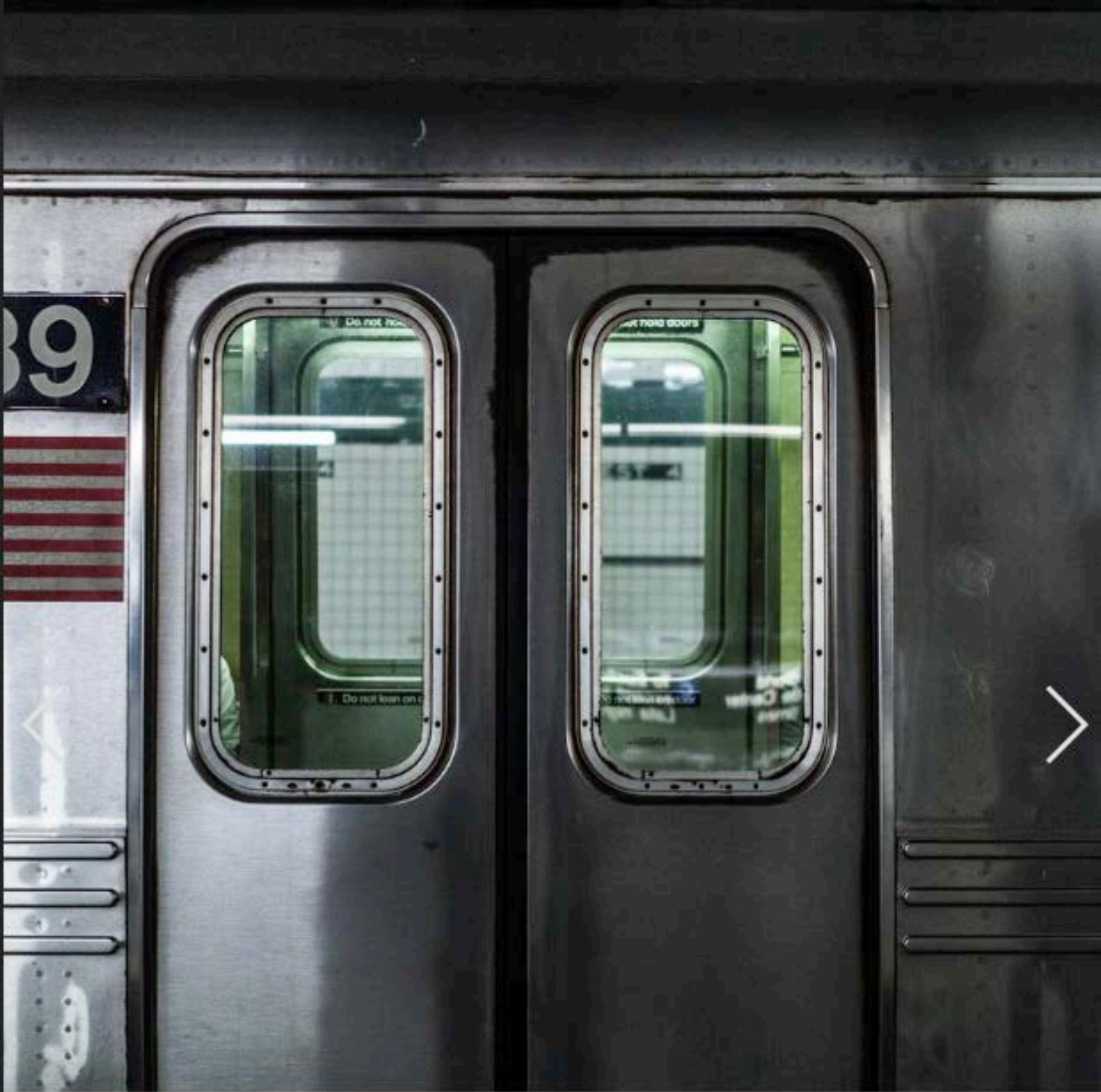


## U.S. CITIES TO VISIT WHERE YOU DON'T NEED TO RENT A CAR

New York City, of course, is a public-transit mecca. It's typically faster to get somewhere via subway, for example, than it is by car. If surface transit is your preference, however, hop in any of the ubiquitous cabs, treat yourself to a pedicab ride or figure out the bus system.



Visiting Miami Beach, Florida? Stay in a densely populated area such as Biscayne Bay, and you won't need a car. There are plenty of activities reachable by foot, and you can also hop on the easy-to-use Metrorail to get around.



Get to Seward, Alaska, by ferry, bus or railroad. Then, explore the popular summertime destination by bike or foot or take a boat tour to see spectacular scenery.





Visitors to Washington, D.C., can easily get around using the city's subway system, its buses, and the D.C. Circulator, a bus system that works especially well for tourists who want to see the main attractions/areas of our nation's capital. And bring comfortable shoes, because you'll definitely do a lot of walking.





Reach historic Daufuskie Island, South Carolina, by passenger ferry or boat, and then stroll the small, charming island or rent a golf cart. Sample the area's famous oysters, and immerse yourself in understanding the island's all-important Gullah culture that has been nurtured by descendants of enslaved Africans.







A ferry (or helicopter, if you're really all that) ride from Long Beach, California, puts you on charming Santa Catalina Island, where you can walk the beaches and visit shops. Rent a golf cart to see even more of the island.
